

## CAMPUS SECURITY AUTHORITY INCIDENT REPORT FORM

## Form Instruction:

- 1. Report any crime that you observe, become aware of, or is reported to you by a victim, perpetrator, witness or third party.
- 2. If the victim or reporting party is reporting any other type of crime besides a sexual harassment, sexual assault, intimate partner violence or stalking, the victim or reporting party may remain anonymous if s/he chooses to do so.
- 3. Please report the incident in a timely manner. The information you provide is important for documentation of the crime as well as duplicate report comparison and may be evaluated for a campus crime alert.
- 4. The location of the crime and type of crime are the two factors which determine if the incident can be counted as a Clery statistic.
- Third party reports of crimes are Clery-reportable, if you believe the information is provided in good faith (not rumor or hearsay).
- 6. No RC affiliation of the victim or reporting party is necessary for the crime to be reported to you and counted as a Clery statistic.
- 7. If you are unsure how to classify a crime, or if a crime occurred, please be sure to provide specific incident details and the Rosemont College Public Safety Department (RCPS) will use these details to evaluate and appropriately classify the crime.

- 8. Attempted crimes are Clery-reportable.
- 9. Report all incidents motivated by bias, regardless of the type of crime that occurred.
- 10. The victim or reporting party is not required to contact law enforcement and no investigation of the crime is required.
- 11. Encourage the victim or reporting party to report the incident to the Rosemont College Public Safety Department at 610-527-1038.

Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter: the willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.   Negligent Manslaughter: the killing of another person through gross negligence.   Sex Offenses, Forcible: Sex Offenses—any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent.   Sex Offenses, Non-Forcible: unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse.   Robbery: the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.   Aggravated Assault: an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.   Burglary: the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft.   Motor Vehicle Theft: the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.   Arson: any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling, house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.   Domestic Violence: a felony or misdemeanor crime of violence committed by:   1) a current or former spouse or intimate partner of the victim or   2) a person with sic orhabitating with or has cohabitated with the victim as a spouse or intimate partner or   4) a person similarly situated to a spouse of the victim under the domestic or family violence laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.   Dating Violence: violence committed by a person:   1) who is or has been in a social relationship in a romantic or intimate nature with the victim and   2) where the existence of such a relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim and   2) where the existence of such a relationship, shall be based on the reporting party's statement and with

If the crime was motivated by bias (see below), you may select one of these categories for reporting purposes.
Hate Crimes: include any of the above mentioned criminal offenses and any incidents of larceny-theft, simple assault, intimidation, destruction/damage/vandalism of property or of other crimes involving bodily injury to any person that are motivated by the offender's bias.
☐ Larceny-Theft: The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Constructive possession is the condition in which a person does not have physical custody or possession but is in a position to exercise dominion or control over a thing.
☐ <b>Simple Assault:</b> The unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, not the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury involving apparent broken bones, loss of teeth, possible internal injury, severe laceration, or loss of consciousness.
Intimidation: Unlawfully placing another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct, but without displaying a weapon or subjecting the victim to actual physical attack.

Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property: Willfully or maliciously destroying, damaging, defacing, or otherwise injuring real or personal property without the consent of the owner or the person having custody or control over it.		
<b>Bias</b> is defined as a preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of persons based on their race, gender, religion, disability, sexual orientation, gender identity ethnicity or national origin.

Race. A preformed negative attitude toward a group of persons who possess common physical characteristics (e.g., color of skin, eyes, and/or hair; facial features, etc.) genetically transmitted by descent and heredity which distinguish them as a distinct division of humankind (e.g., Asians, blacks, whites).  Gender. A preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of persons because those persons are male or female.  Religion. A preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of persons who share the same religious beliefs regarding the origin and purpose of the universe and the existence or nonexistence of a supreme being (e.g., Catholics, Jews, Protestants, atheists).  Sexual orientation. A preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of persons based on their sexual attraction toward, and responsiveness to, members of their own sex or members of the opposite sex (e.g., gays, lesbians, heterosexuals).  Ethnicity/national origin. A preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of persons of the same race or national origin who share common or similar traits, languages, customs and traditions (e.g., Arabs, Hispanics).  Disability. A preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of persons based on their physical or mental impairments/challenges, whether such disability is temporary or permanent, congenital or acquired by heredity, accident, injury, advanced age or illness.
